

She reminisced, "The combined aspects of business and excitement are things I will never forget."

Her high school career wasn't just about academics. In addition to DECA, Lauren was involved in many other extracurricular activities such as volleyball, tennis, UNICEF, NHS, Green Club, Rotary, and was a Mentor Group Leader. It was the classes that Vincent took at Powers Catholic which prompted him to consider studying law in college. He said, "I am hoping to obtain a 'politics, philosophy, and economics degree' which combines a lot of the subjects I found interesting at Powers." In thinking about his Catholic education, Vincent looked back at his experience in Theology class and remembers his freshman year in particular. He described his Theology teacher, Mr. Costello, as a natural storyteller. In one class, the topic was the story of David and Goliath, which Vincent had heard all through his Catholic upbringing. Vincent said, "Even though I'd heard the story many, many times, I was glued to listening to it all over again because of the way Mr. Costello presented it."

Vincent was also one of the daily school announcers and he described a favorite memory of his as he was finishing announcements. He said, "My friend, who was also an announcer, tried black licorice for the first time and hated it. My friend spat it out and viciously wiped their tongue. While it happened I had a desperate thought to maintain composure. I did not and I laughed hysterically over the PA."

When it comes to words of advice he would pass on to current students, he had several suggestions. First, he recommended that students not only attend school events, but also participate in the themes for that event. He commented that getting involved in the theme definitely adds to the experience. Secondly, he suggested that students try attending some non-sporting events like the plays or band concerts. He said, "The people in those productions put in so much effort and it always comes through." He also said, "Finally, study at least a week before finals. That way, not only are you prepared, but you also have a mental buffer that wards off the immense stress."

Faith impacts all of the decisions that Abbie makes in her life. While at Powers, she would often ask Mr. Sheeran for advice with big decisions. He always came through with good guidance and told her to go with her gut. She still follows that advice beginning her first year in college. "I kept wondering if this is where God wanted me to be and he kept showing me in so many ways that this is the place he wanted and planned for me", she said. "Faith is so important, especially after leaving high school because you are on your own and sometimes that can be a little scary and overwhelming. Falling back on your faith allows you to grow closer to God."

She attributes her life path to her time at Powers. "I think that being a part of clubs-- especially clubs that allow you to do service and give back to the community like UNICEF and Rotary—those clubs make you a better person and allow you to be more involved in the Powers community", she said. The clubs allowed Abbie to make many connections with the teachers at Powers and numerous friends.

For current students, she offers this advice: "Get involved and go to as many events as you can. During my senior year, my friends and I would try to make it to every event and every game we could go to. I remember having so much fun and making so many memories with them." Even if the event is something that isn't typically well-attended, she encourages students to still take the time to be there. "It brings you closer with the friends you have and it also give you the opportunity to talk and meet people you may have never had a conversation with.

With all the highlights of her high school years, Abbie said it is difficult for you to pick a favorite memory because she had so many great times. "If I had to pick a few, I would say the bike ride of the last day of my senior year and any of the whole school house games we had." She credits her senior year with being the best of the four years.

Thanks to this incredible team, Powers pulled ahead in the last seconds of the game to win their 23rd game of the season. The 3-2 game secured the team a spot in the Flint Area Sports Hall of Fame and accomplished a decades-long goal for PCHS athletics.

If I could give myself advice as a student, it would be to join clubs and teams ASAP!


Currently, I am a 9th grade English teacher at PCHS. My favorite thing about working for Powers is that it really feels like a family.
